

Football fans planning to drink on Super Bowl Sunday (Feb. 2) are reminded to plan ahead for a sober ride home or call a *last-second audible* before getting behind the wheel. The Duluth Police Department and law enforcement agencies around the state will be stepping up DWI enforcement patrols to *sack* drunk drivers as Minnesota tries to make it six years running without a drunk driving death on Super Bowl Sunday.

There have been six traffic deaths during the last five Super Bowl Sundays; however, none were alcohol-related. There were 995 motorists arrested for DWI on those days.

Keys to a Safe Super Bowl Sunday/Tips to Prevent Drunk Driving

- · Plan for a sober ride designate a sober driver, use a cab/public transportation or stay at the location of celebration.
- · Offer to be a designated driver or be available to pick up a loved one anytime, anywhere.
- Buckle up the best defense against a drunk driver.
- Report drunk driving call 911 when witnessing impaired driving behavior. Be prepared to provide location, license plate number and observed dangerous behavior.

Drunk Driving in Minnesota

Each year, nearly 28,000 people are arrested for DWI and one in seven Minnesota drivers has a DWI on record.

DWI Consequences

A DWI offense can result in loss of license for up to a year, thousands in costs and possible jail time.

Repeat DWI offenders, as well as first-time offenders arrested at 0.16 and above alcohol-concentration level, must use ignition interlock in order to regain legal driving privileges or face at least one year without a driver's license. Offenders with three or more

offenses are required to use interlock for three to six years, or they will never regain driving privileges.
